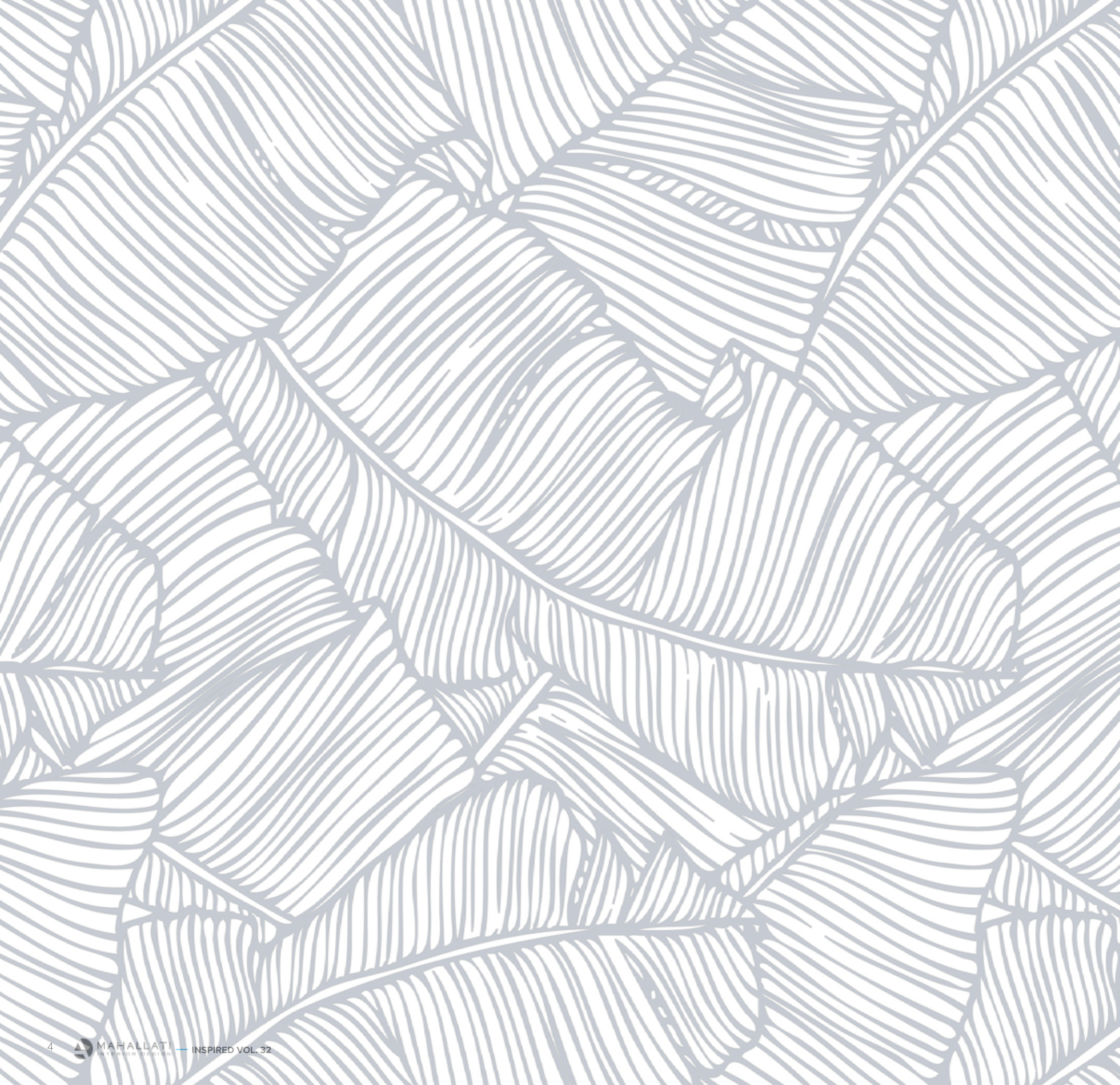

BACHELOR PAD

DEFIES STEREOTYPES

For the young football player, designer Keshia Franklin conjures a sophisticated home base for entertaining family and friends.

Colin Kaepernick may be misunderstood. Even his interior designer, Keshia Franklin, admits to misjudging how the then-20-something-year-old football player's public persona would translate to the 5,000-square-foot San Jose home she was commissioned to design for him.



In the living room of a San Jose, California home, the bronze Kailash coffee table is by Chista, the sofa is by Christian Liaigre, the Still Coupe lounge chairs are by Holly Hunt, the custom cowhide carpet is by Kyle Bunting and the Navarro table lamp is by Arteriors.

"I'm looking at this young, successful man, who is a superstar football player. I thought: we're definitely going to do an ultra man cave experience, with leather and dark moody colors — a sexy vibe," says Franklin. "But, during our first meeting, I quickly realized that he had a much more refined, sophisticated taste than what I thought he would be attracted to."

Perhaps it was the community's profusion of transitional-style homes that informed Kaepernick's taste. But Franklin offers up another clue: "He expressed his fascination with modern hotels that he liked along his travels, which put my creative plan in place," she says.

With life on the road as her singular, albeit ironic, source of inspiration, Franklin set out to create a home base for the young athlete (then signed with the San Francisco 49ers) where he could entertain family and friends.

The tone-on-tone dining space, takes a decidedly neutral turn from the rest of the home, but the palette is balanced by a collection of angular accessories for an equal amount of edge.

“He would always say that he was a daredevil,” Franklin says. “He’d be the guy to jump off of the building or do really extreme sports, so some of [the color] you see comes from that.”

Thought dining chairs by Cliff Young, a dining table by Century Furniture, a Tantrum pendant light by Corbett Lighting and a credenza by Modshop outfit the dining room.

With a palette derived from Kaepernick’s bold spirit and sophisticated taste, Franklin worked her way through the home’s four bedrooms, living room and den, playing with texture and shapes along the way.

The 7-month-long project would take Franklin out of her comfort zone both figuratively and geographically, making trips from New York to San Jose for stretches as long as one month at a time. But it would also represent a critical juncture in her career in interior design.

"My business is mainly referral based, which is great, but I can't say that every project was really fulfilling," she says.

After completing Goldman Sach's 10,000 Small Businesses program, "I knew that I had to create a bit of a niche for myself."

Instead of catering to her client's whims, Franklin honed in on her passion for clean lines and organic flourishes, rebranding her firm, The Beautiful Experience, as Halden Interiors just as the Kaepernick project came her way.



In a guest room, the walls are painted in Benjamin Moore's Satchel; the bed and nightstand are by ModLoff and the pillows are covered in a fabric by Romo.

"I'm seeing a trend happening in my work that I'm learning to appreciate and accept," she says. "Before, it didn't matter what type of design aesthetic you wanted — traditional? I've got you; eclectic? I can do that, too — but where my strength is, is modern design."

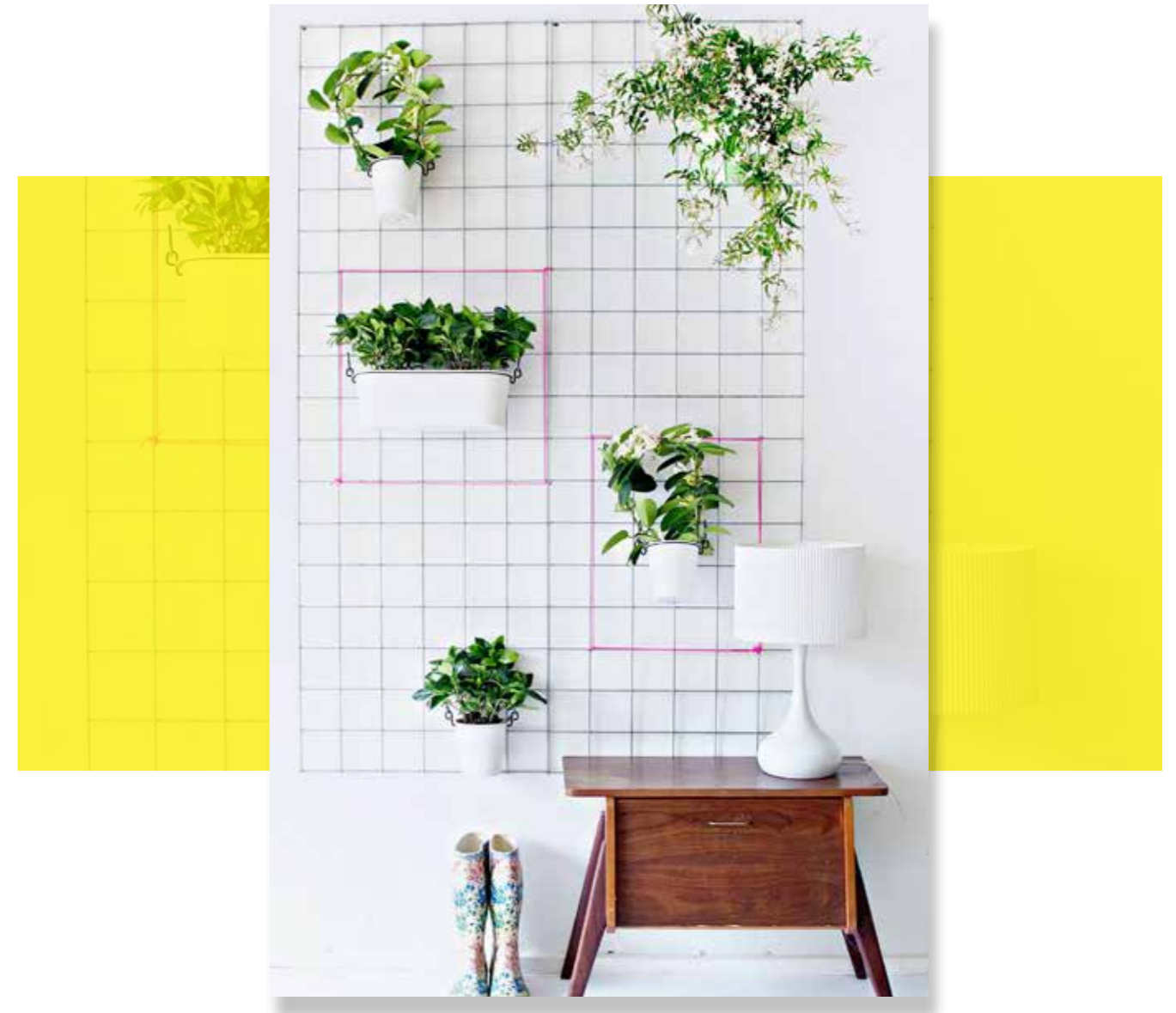

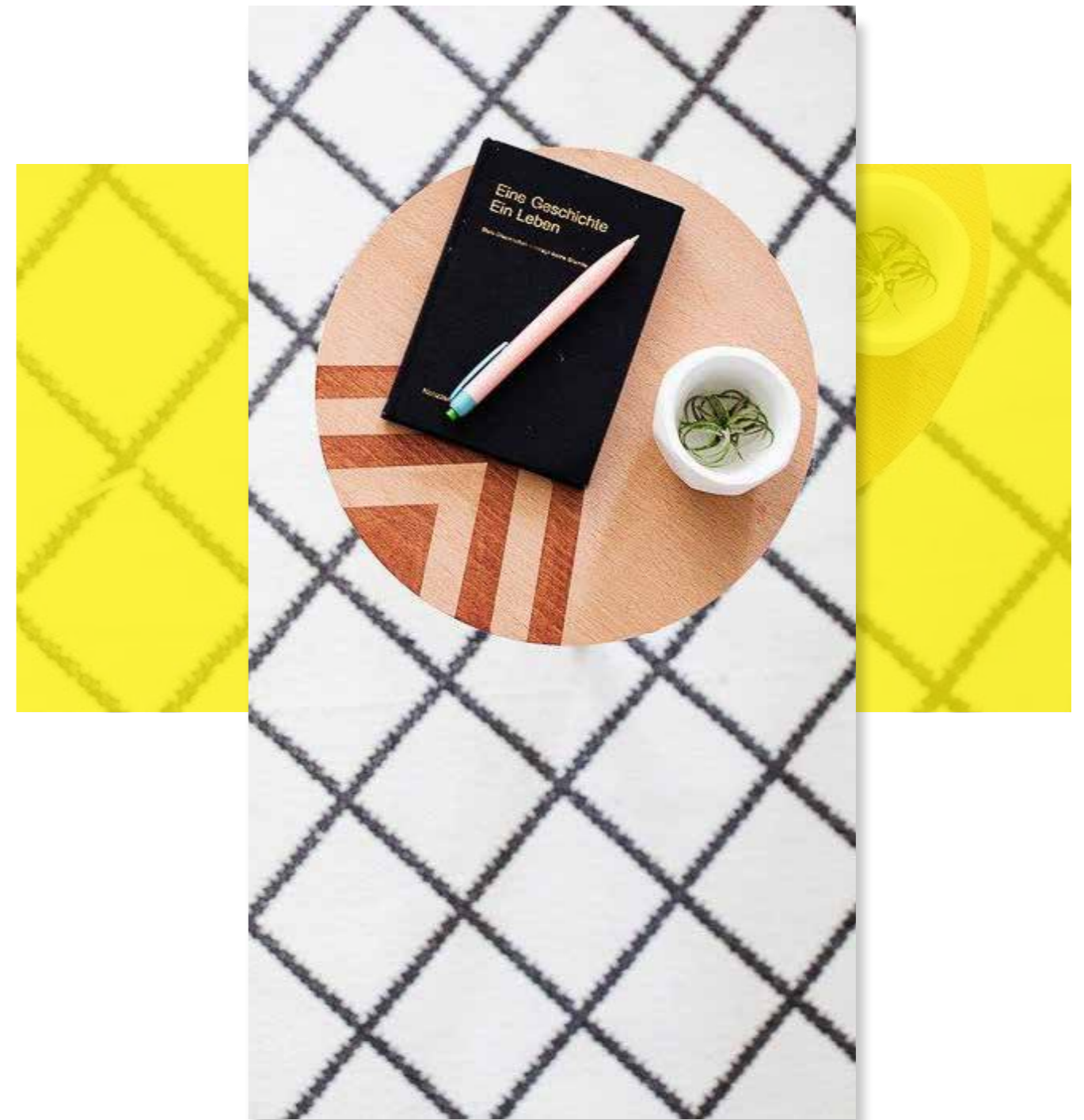

05 A DISAPPEARING DESK

“For tight quarters, consider a ship-style table that lifts up for use. Here’s why this one works.

1. A shelf that becomes a table. Ikea’s drop-leaf Norberg design is hinge-mounted on the wall. When the top is up, it’s a desk; when it’s lowered, it becomes a shallow shelf.

2. The surprisingly generous tabletop is big enough for a laptop; it also works as a dining table for two.

3. Desk accessories line up on the shelf, which remains in place when the desk is folded down.

4. A chair with a slim silhouette, the industrial French Nicolle, pairs well with the fold-down desk.

5. An Original BTC Hector clip light hangs from a Bed Bath & Beyond metal towel ladder, another adaptable design that stands ready to hold magazines and even sweaters and jackets.”



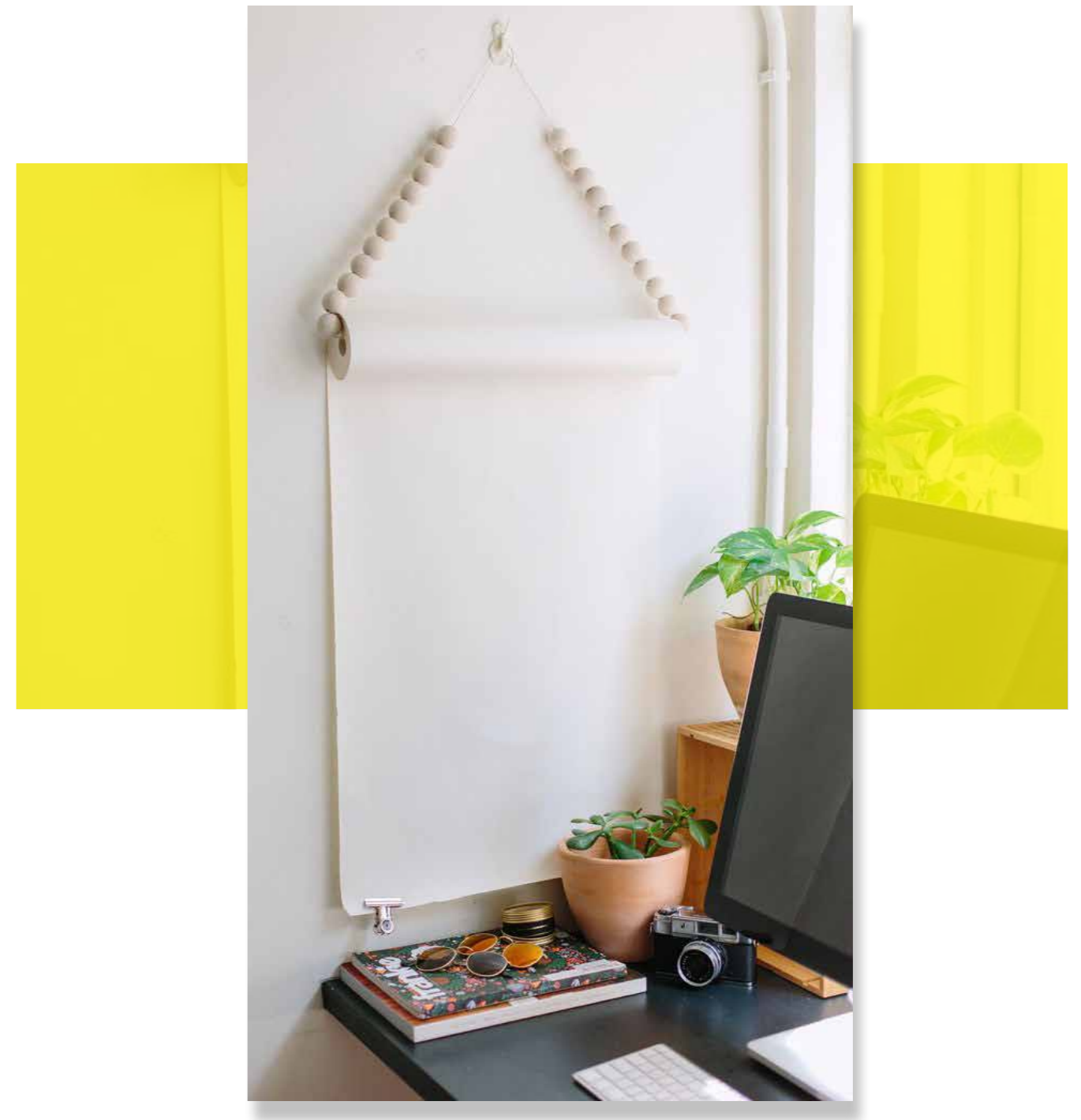
06 DOUBLE-DUTY TASK LIGHTING

09 THE INSTANT UTILITY CLOSET

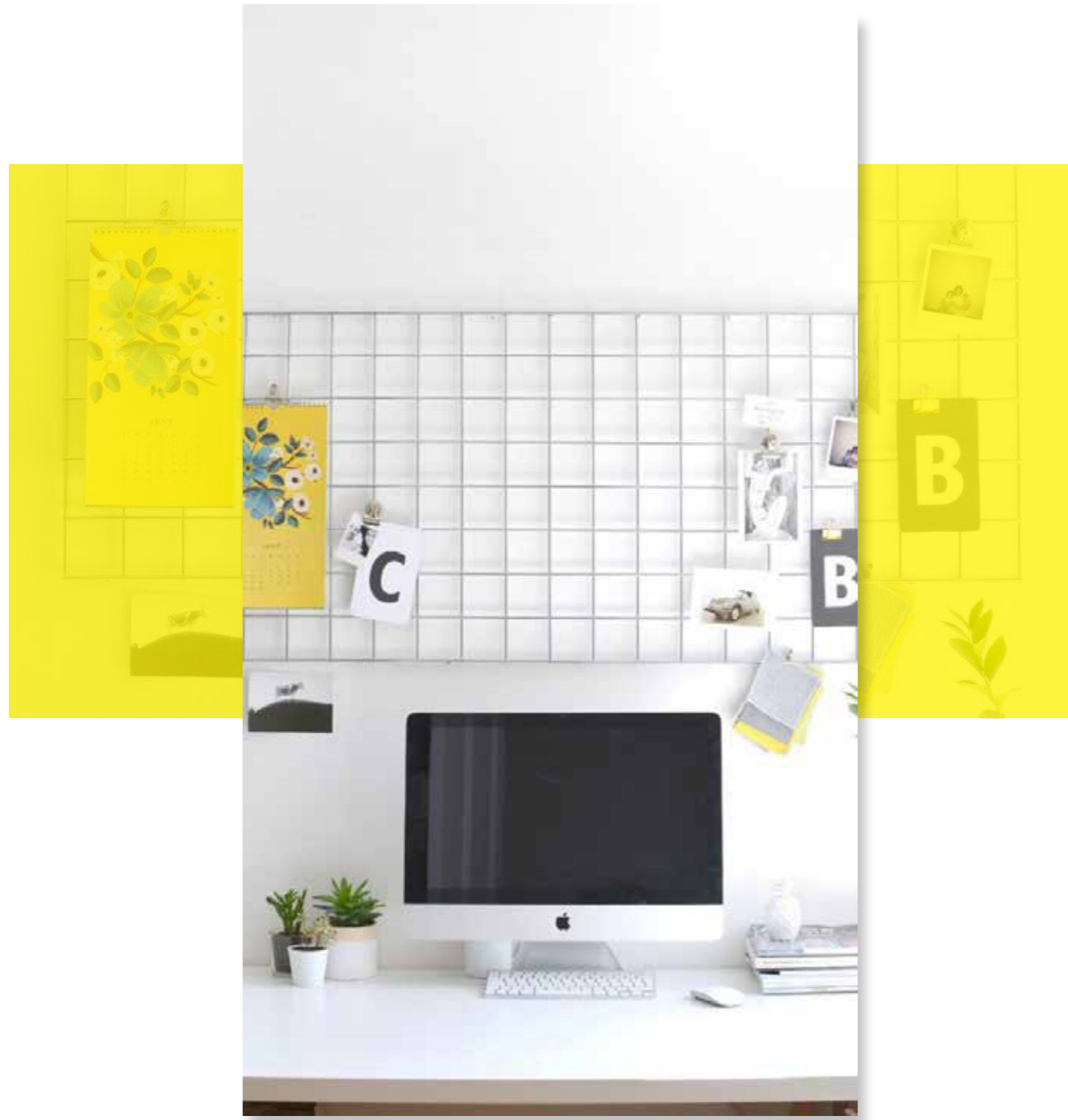

2. Mounted on a closet door, an oak Shaker rail (from the Container Store) holds a lineup of basics. And in the closet, to maximize use of space, a vacuum is stowed atop an Elfa cart.”

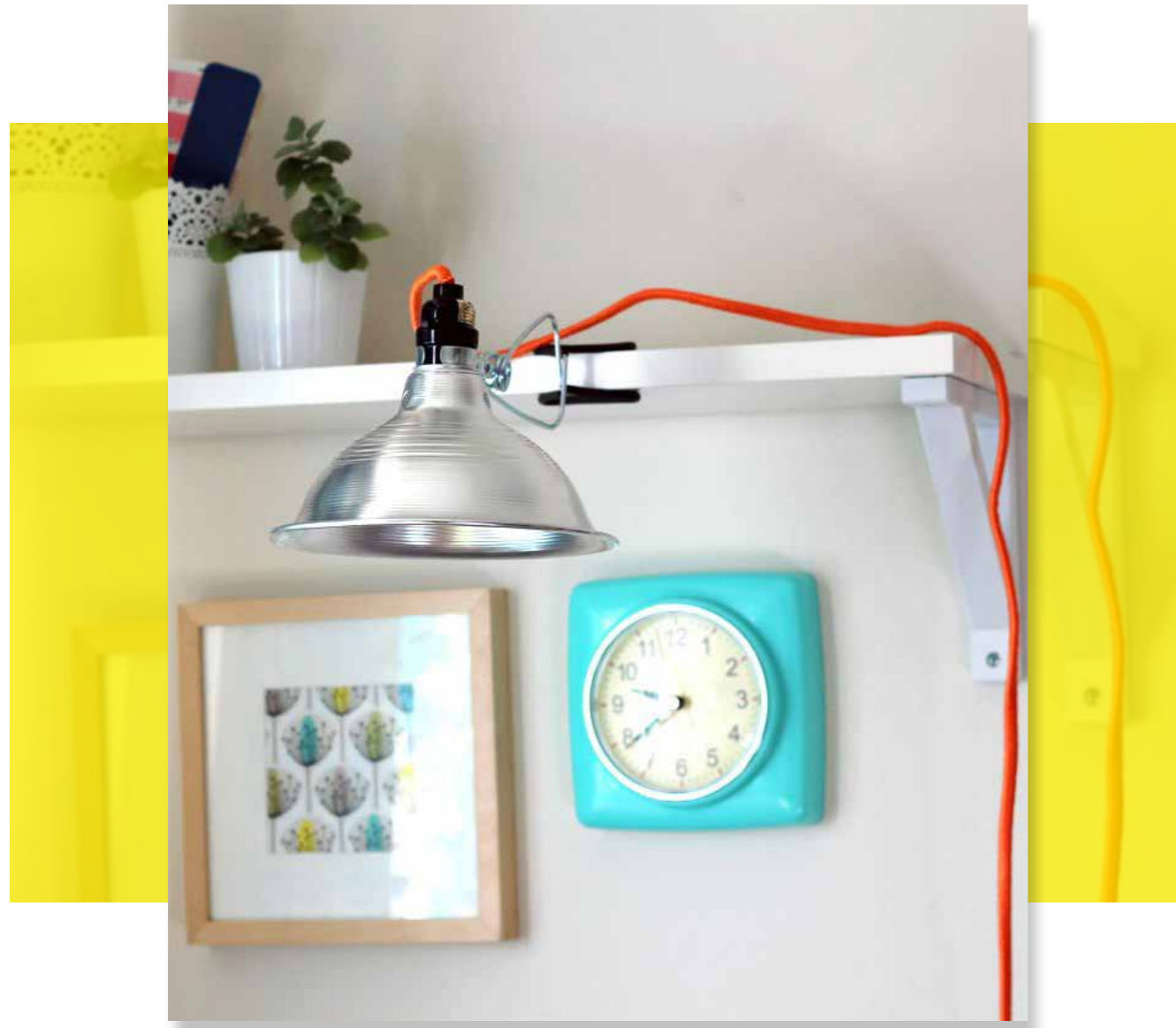

THE INSTANT UTILITY CLOSET

“Create a designated place for herbs and frequently used tools like a garlic press and graters. Dried herbs have a short shelf life, especially if they’re exposed to light, so keeping only small quantities makes sense, as does arranging them in a drawer or cupboard. No fitted insert necessary; corral everything on trays. Here’s what you need.

The Essentials

- Uniform glass jars—we like small

paint jars from the art supply store

- Metal trays sized to fit your drawer
- Washi tape for labeling the jar tops (this is an idea we like from cookbook author Heidi Swanson)

IT CAN BE DOWNRIGHT BAFFLING TO PIN DOWN THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN TWO SEEMINGLY IDENTICAL CONCEPTS. IN THE EPIC CLASH OF LIVING ROOM VS. FAMILY ROOM, IS THERE REALLY A CLEAR DISTINCTION? AS A MATTER OF FACT, YES.

JUST AS WE DISCOVERED WHEN EXPLORING THE NUANCES BETWEEN MODERN AND CONTEMPORARY DESIGN,

THERE'S A LOT IN A LABEL. WHILE PLENTY OF PEOPLE USE THE TERMS "LIVING ROOM" AND "FAMILY ROOM" MORE OR LESS INTERCHANGEABLY, THEY ACTUALLY AREN'T THE SAME THING — LARGER HOMES SOMETIMES EVEN HAVE BOTH — AND IT ALL COMES DOWN TO HOW YOU USE THE SPACE.

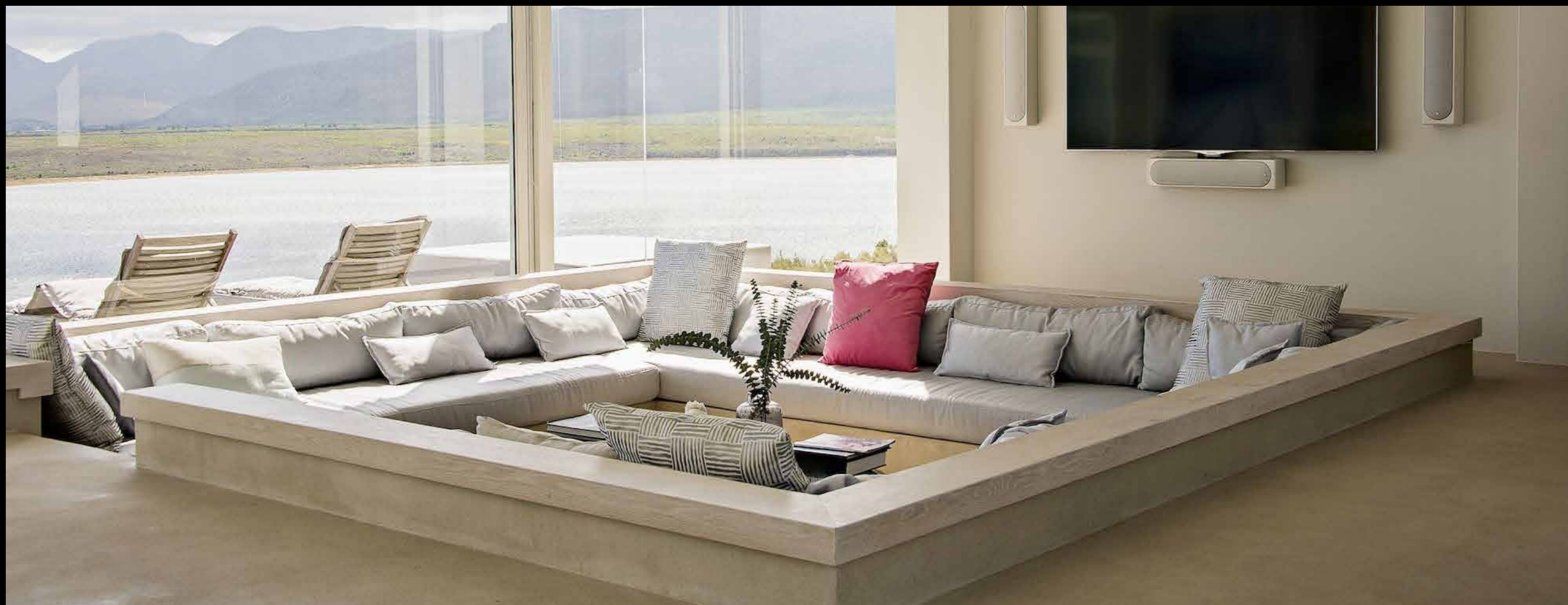
Living Room

Along with the kitchen, the living room is the main common space in most family homes, but the exact nature of how to use it has been mysterious for a long time.

According to Joan DeJean, writing for the New York Times, living rooms started out as formal display spaces for welcoming guests in the 17th century, but slowly morphed into the more casual gathering spaces that we know today. In some contemporary homes, the living room is totally relaxed, but in others, especially larger homes with multiple common areas, the living room retains its more formal underpinnings.

As DeJean explains, "Some homes have a grand living room that gets only occasional use, while ordinary social activities take place in a smaller room with another name like family room or rec room. And in many homes, people socialize in the kitchen, while the living room, even if it's not intended to make a design statement, gets almost no regular use."





Family Room

The family room serves a similar function in the home to a living room: it's a gathering place for everyone to convene and relax together at the end of the day. That said, there are some differences. Family rooms are more relaxed spaces, and tend to be more kid-friendly. It's also a newer concept that dates to the mid-century.

In their book *Peeking Through The Keyhole*, authors Avi Friedman and David Krawitz note, "In the years following the Second World War, new spaces were created to accommodate activities unsuited to a formal living room or parlour," among them, "the family room, outfitted with a television and with furniture that could actually be used by children, an informal place where people could relax and spread out."

Is There Really a Different?

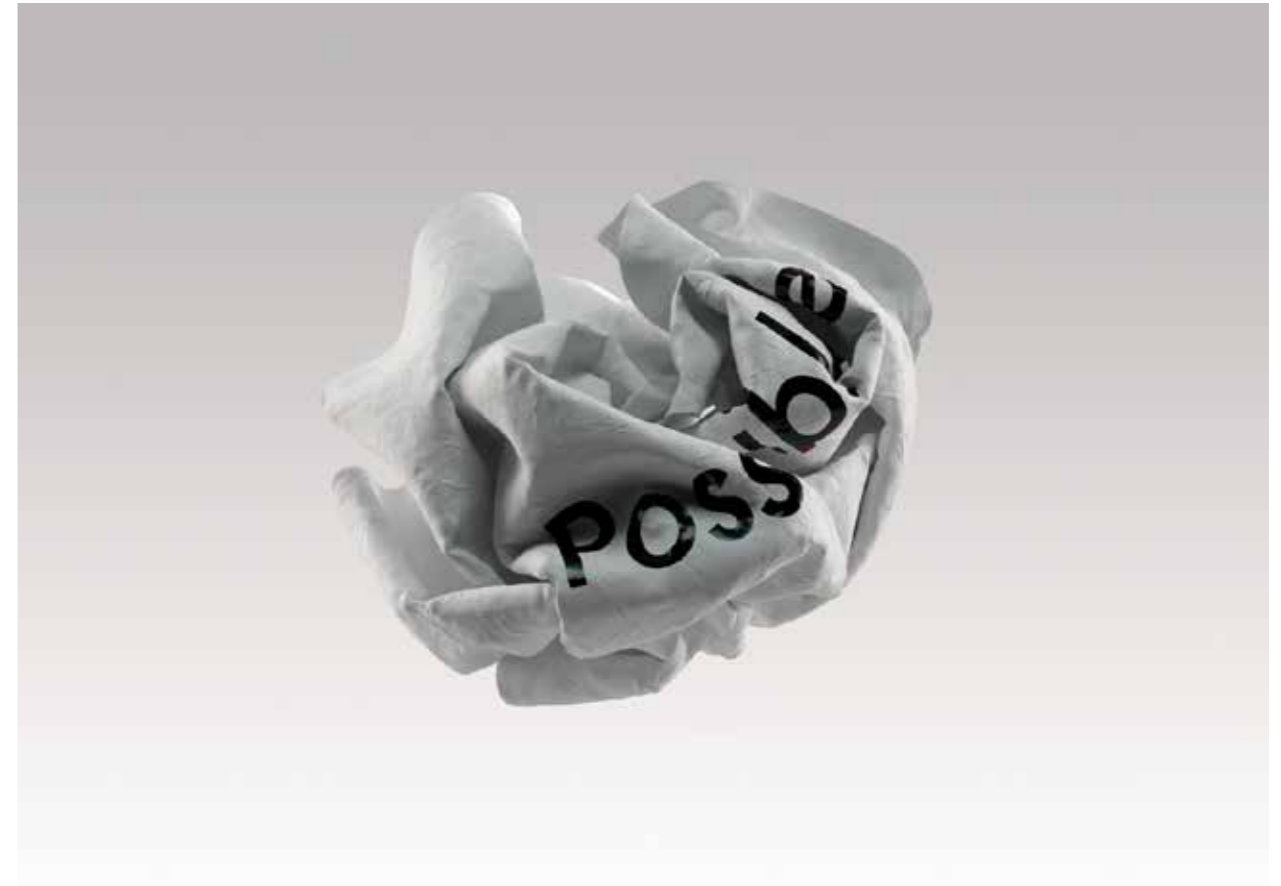
At the end of the day, it's up the individual to define what a living room or family room really is for their household. Got lots of space and need to clarify what's what? Use both labels to denote how formal the room is. But if you live in a smaller space with one main gathering area, call it whatever you like – life is short, and the living room should be for living.

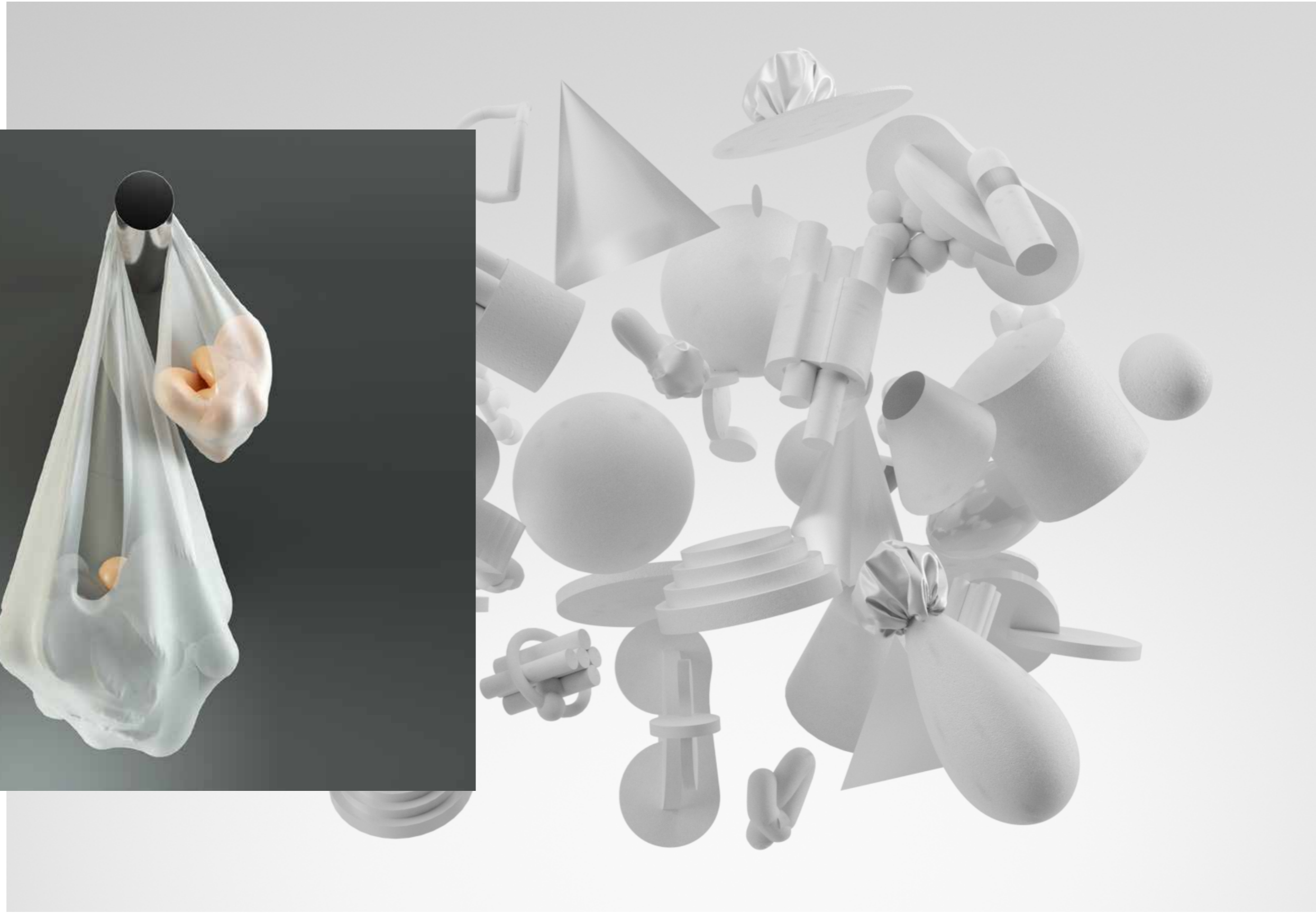

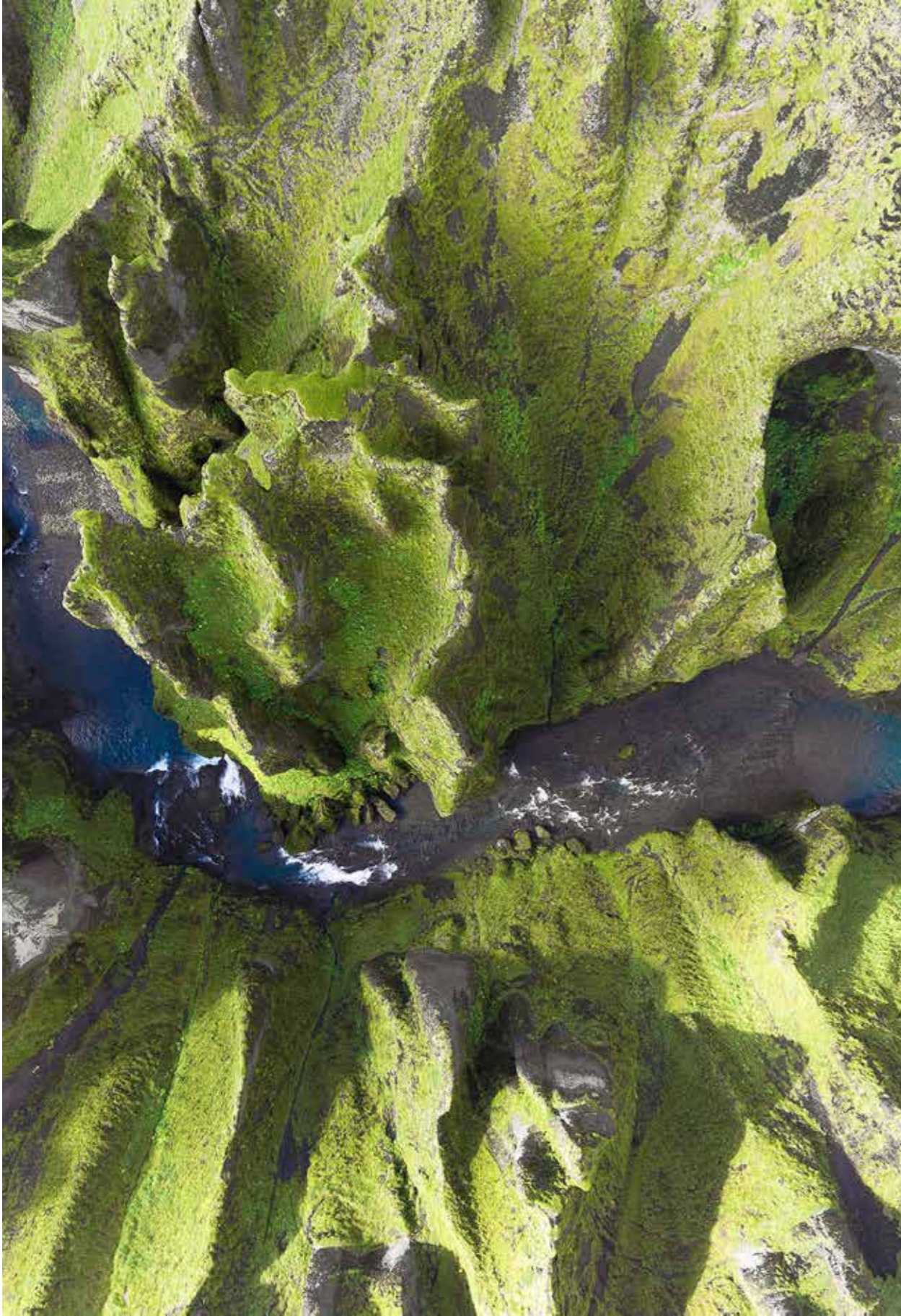
